INTRODUCTION

Every level of government plays a crucial role in ensuring the welfare of its people. In light of the economic challenges Nigeria is facing, especially in recent times, citizens are increasingly relying on the government to lead initiatives aimed at improving their living conditions.

But how well-positioned is the government to address these needs?

To gain insight into this, it is essential to evaluate budgetary allocations at both the federal and state levels

The National Assembly approved the sum of N54.99 trillion as FY:2025 Federal Government budget, an increase of 56.9% compared to the 2024 approved budget of N35.06 trillion. Also, the total budgeted spending by States for FY:2025 amount to N26.3 trillion. Cumulatively, both the Federal and State Governments have budgeted a total of N81.3 trillion.

We analyze this project in this report, to show what these amounts mean to the average Nigerian, if these budgets were to be shared among all Nigerians.

By presenting important budget figures and measures at the national level – federal and state, this report contributes to discussions on the adequacy of Nigeria's budget. It examines the total budget, the proportion of capital expenditure in the total budget, the average budget size per citizen, the budget to GDP ratio, as well as changes and real growth in the budget size after adjusting for inflation.

Notably, what may appear as relatively high budgets can become less significant when considering the needs, measured by population size, economic size, and inflationary trends.

As Nigeria strives to enhance the efficiency of its public spending, it is essential to attract and maintain both domestic and foreign private investment that can complement public investment, particularly in sectors that significantly affect citizens' welfare.

TOTAL BUDGET

This is made up of the federal government budget of N54.99 trillion and the total state governments budget of N26.30 trillion.

- ✓ The substantial budget increases across all levels suggest a response to address economic conditions such as the increase in the minimum wage, investment in infrastructure, and other key sectors of the economy, as well as increase in price level.



BUDGET GROWTH & GDP

- ✓ After accounting for inflation, the 2025 Federal government budget shows an increase of 31.9% compared to 2024 budget.
 - The estimated ratio of FGN budget to GDP is 15.6%. on the average.
- ✓ At the states level, the 2025 budget increased by 17.4% in real terms compared to 2024, while the budget to GDP ratio is estimated at 7.5%
- Nationally, the overall growth of the 2025 budget is 26.9%. The budget to GDP ratio is estimated at 23.1% on the average.

High nominal growth relative to real growth suggest that inflation is a significant issue.

• Sustainable development requires balancing spending with inflation control, revenue growth, and efficient resource allocation.

CAPITAL BUDGET

- ✓ The total capital expenditure at the federal level is N23.96 trillion, while at the state level it is N17.56 trillion, bringing the total capital budget at the national level to N41.51 trillion.
- Share of capital in total budget shows that 43.6% is being allocated to capital projects at the Federal level.
- ✓ At the state level, about 66.7% of the total budget is allocated to capital expenditures.

This highlights a strong commitment to capital investments to address local needs and stimulate economic growth.

✓ Overall, the average Share of Capital in Budget at the national level stands at 51.1%



BUDGET PER CITIZEN (NAIRA)



- ✓ The Federal budget per capita amounts to N235,706. This means that, on average, each citizen can spend N645.8 daily, if the budget were shared among all Nigerians.
- Cumulatively, if the national budget were to be shared by citizens, each person will get N348,481
 per year from the 2025 budget; that is, each person gets N955 daily from the budget.

The budget per citizen is a useful indicator of how much government investment is available for each individual, how much the government plans to spend on each citizen.



BUDGET PER CITIZEN (DOLLAR)



✓ In dollar terms, daily budget per person for 2025 is \$0.63 at the national level, which is lower compared to the 2024 value of \$0.86 per capita daily.

• The values at the federal and state levels are \$0.43 and \$0.21, respectively, both of which are lower compared to 2024.

The daily budget per person at all levels (national, federal, and state) is far below the poverty line of \$2.15.

This indicates that the budget, when the population, distributed across is insufficient basic needs the to meet of citizens, such as food, healthcare, and education.
